Soprano: Louise Woodgate

Louise graduated from Oxford Brookes University in 2000 and continued her vocal studies at Trinity College of Music, London.

After several years of teaching Louise is now concentrating on her solo performance with Quentin Hayes. She has given recitals at venues such as The Holywell music rooms and Jacqueline Dupre Building Oxford. She features regularly at the Royal Military College of Science proms, performing with the Central Band of the Royal Air Force, The Royal Marines, The Scots Guards, and The Irish Guards.

Recent performances have included Richard Strauss Four Last Songs with orchestra.

Operatic roles include 2^{nd} Lady Magic flute, Flora La Traviata and Tatiana Eugine Onegin with Oxford Touring Opera.

In 2001 soprano Louise Woodgate and mezzo soprano Anna Pelly set up their own opera company 'Opera Soufflé.' Their primary aim is to entertain; to show just how dramatic, how funny, how sexy Opera can be. Productions range from the more theatrical dramatic "mini Opera" to pure cabaret froth. All productions are staged and lavishly costumed.

Opera Soufflé perform extensively in aid of Charities such as Juvenile Diabetes, Pestalozzi and See Saw as well as various national hospices.

In January 2007 Louise will be playing the role of Eponine in Pimlico Opera's production of Les Miserables in January 2007. This will take place in Wandsworth Prison and the inmates will be taking part.

The Faringdon Singers is a small friendly group which sings regularly throughout West Oxfordshire and Gloucestershire. Any monies raised from concerts, by way of retiring collections is donated to various charities. The Singers, around 35 in number, come from a wide area around Faringdon and have been directed since 1993 by Terence Carter. Their repertoire includes both sacred and secular choral music as well as more extended choral works, accompanied and unaccompanied.

Conductor: Terence Carter

Terence has directed the Faringdon Singers since September 1993. Before that he accompanied the Singers, his first concert with them being in June 1979. Educated at Jesus College Oxford, he played an active part in the musical life of the College and University as organist and accompanist. He subsequently gained the Fellowship and Choirmaster's Diplomas of the Royal College of Organists. He was Director of Music at Wantage Choral Society from 1982 – 2003. He accompanied chapel services at Pembroke College Oxford and was organist and sometime conductor of the Christ Church Cathedral Voluntary Choir (now the Cathedral Singers). He also played the organ at Hereford Cathedral in concerts given by combined City church choirs over a number of years, and has performed at a wide variety of local venues. Terence was appointed Chairman of the Oxfordshire District Committee of the Royal School of Church Music in 2006.

Pianist: Peter Cowdrey

Peter Cowdrey is a freelance composer and pianist based in the Oxford Area. Recent works include two song cycles, Song Thrush and The Lucy Poems, which were premiered in Sunningwell in July. His Second String Quartet will be premiered by the Brodsky Quartet in Derry in 2007. Peter is also writing an opera based on wine diaries by Michael Broadbent, to be performed in the Great Rooms at Christie's in London. As pianist he has played Charles Ives' First Piano Sonata on tour in South America, and is currently learning some of Messiaen's Catalogue d'Oiseaux to perform at Les Montagn'Arts Festival near Grenoble, alongside his own birdsong inspired compositions. Other interests include the acoustics of Neolithic buildings.
